FROM THE HEADMASTER'S DESK

Dear Parents, Caregivers, and Friends of Waihi,

One of the great privileges of school life is seeing young people stretch themselves, sometimes with nerves, sometimes with excitement, but always with courage. These past two weeks have been filled with moments where our students have done just that, and it has been a joy to watch them grow in the process.

Last week's Ladies' Lunch was a wonderful occasion and one of the real highlights of the term. It was a chance to pause amidst the busyness of school life and celebrate the remarkable women who support our students. Our guest speaker, Jake Bailey, captivated everyone with his story and message. Many will remember Jake from his now-famous Head Boy speech at Christchurch Boys' High School, delivered just one week after being diagnosed with an aggressive cancer. Now, a decade later and cancer-free, he has turned his experience into a mission to help young people build resilience.

Jake spoke about what he calls the Four S's: slowing down and taking one step at a time, salvaging the good through gratitude, streamlining by setting aside everyday fears, and standing alongside others by offering support. His relaxed and relatable style left us all with practical tools and a timely reminder that true resilience is built not by avoiding challenge, but by learning to face it. His words resonated deeply with our belief in the value of outdoor education, creating opportunities for young people to stretch themselves and discover strength in moments of discomfort.

Last Monday, we were treated to perfect conditions at Roundhill for our Family Ski Day. With blue skies above and great snow underfoot, it was the ideal backdrop for families, students, and staff to enjoy a day of fun and adventure together.

Another highlight from last week was our inaugural Spring Soirée, an evening of music, kapa haka, dance, and performance. The talent of our students was on full display, and the feedback from attendees has been overwhelmingly positive. A heartfelt thank you to Al and Sheryl Bradley for their dedication and vision in bringing this event to life. The Soirée has laid the foundation for what we know will become a much-loved annual celebration of the arts at Waihi.

Some of our Year Seven students took part in the NIWA Science and Technology Fair in Timaru, where their hard work and creativity were recognised with impressive results, placing second and fourth in the intermediate age group category.

RESILIENCE



AND THE FOUR 'S' MODEL

WHAT	Resilience is the ability to overcome and recover from both big and small challenges we face in our lives (adversity)
WHY	Things will go wrong for us all at some point. There's no way to avoid this, so it pays to prepare with resilience
HOW	The 4S Model - Four key tools to use during tough times, derived from lived experience and proven by research

SLOW DOWN

Break up big challenges and adversity into a series of smaller goals, or you risk becoming overwhelmed. Focus on getting through each week, day, or hour at time, whatever you can manage, before tackling the next one. Eyes on where your feet are going next, not the summit of the mountain

SALVAGE

Deliberately seek out anything good within challenging situations. Any piece of happiness, no matter how small, is crucial to capture during tough times. Try to feed all incoming information through the lens of "what in this is positive?" - even if those answers are quite creative

STREAMLINE

Where possible, spend part of each day away from the common worries and anxieties we all face, or else these can keep you weighed down when you're already fighting to keep above the water, and can even rewire your brain to process all information through the worry part of your brain rather than the problem solving part

STAND ALONGSIDE

Don't climb mountains alone. People who face adversity on their own have far worse outcomes than those who are part of something bigger than themselves - be that a family, friend group, sport, religion, culture, club, etc. You need to begin building these networks of support before the time comes when you need them

Haircuts

A couple of parents have asked recently about whether we have a school policy on haircuts. We have never seen the need to expressly describe what is expected regarding boys' hair other than to say it needs to be short, neat and sensible. Girls' hair should be tied back neatly off the face.

Obviously as fashions change some students may wish to 'experient' and the description above is open to interpretation.

For those who seek more guidance, perhaps we could say the style of the hair should not be extreme, including, but not limited to mohawk, mullet, shaved styles and/or patterns, no severe changes in length for boys (i.e. a similar even length). 

This term, our Year 7 students have been diving into the world of narrative writing. 



SCIENCE FAIR


